





THE ANNUAL DAY-OUT TO THE GURKHA MUSEUM, WINCHESTER AND THE SIR HAROLD HILLIER GARDENS, ROMSEY. 23RD MAY 2015.



This event has been organised each year since 1998 by Former British Army Gurkha Mr. Kamal Bahadur Purja of Eastleigh and in recent years with the assistance of Maddhat Shamuha and Eastleigh Gurkha Nepalese Association, Aldershot, Farnborough and Camberley. The event is timed to see the Gardens when the world famous collection of rhododendrons is at its' breathtaking best.

The rhododendron is the national flower of Nepal and, in recognition of this, the Gardens, a Department of Hampshire County Council, has created a Nepalese Garden within its' bounds. This feature is centred on a traditional resting place (Chautara) for porters on the mountain trails carrying goods on their backs in the typical conical wicker baskets (dhoka).



This year, the 200th anniversary of the Gurkhas first enlisting in the service of the British Army, was marked by a full Remembrance Service at the Chautara with the laying of wreaths and all the traditional features of Remembrance Day.

The Service was of special significance for Kamal Bahadur Purja as he was commemorating the death on the Western Front WW1 of his honoured Great Uncle, Rfn. Surbir Bahadur Purja, all the more poignant as he died just when he was due to go on leave. Kamal, his wife Shanti



and her sister Parbati were also honouring the memory of Parbati's husband, Cpl Kumar Pun who died in action in Afghanistan 2009.

Anyone who has not yet visited The Gardens owes it to themselves to correct this omission. Quite apart from the rhododendrons and azaleas, the Gardens offer a beautiful display of so many plants, trees and flowers from all over the World with spectacular garden sculptures waiting to surprise and delight the visitor.



Under the skilled management of its' Director Wolfgang Bopp and well-served by his dedicated staff, the Gardens have developed out of all recognition over recent years. From the Visitors Centre and its' Education Wing to its' feature pieces throughout the walks, the Gardens are a work of supreme beauty and enlightenment for all.



The Gurkha Museum is sited in Peninsular Barracks, Romsey Road, Winchester where also you will find museums dedicated to The Hussars, The Green Jackets, Light Infantry, Army Air Corps and Royal Hampshire Regiment. This is a facility of immense interest to former Gurkhas and anyone interested in their priceless contribution to two hundred years of British military history. It was in 1815

that Nepal first sent its' Gurkhas to serve in the armies of Great Britain, the year of Waterloo, thus this year is a very special 200 year anniversary.



Visit the Museum to learn so much more of the vital contribution this tiny but so brave nation, nestled in the shadow of the mighty Himalaya has made to our nation's history, from the Indian Mutiny to the Falklands, Iraq and Afghanistan. You will see evidence of 26 Victoria Crosses awarded to the



Gurkha Regiments through these momentous years. Did you know that over 90,000 Gurkhas held the line in the trenches of the First World War and suffered over 20,000 casualties, killed and wounded and that over 120,000 served in WW2 and suffered over 23,000 killed and wounded?

This year, so momentous to both Nepal and to Great Britain, was marked by a Service of Remembrance at the Chautara in the Gardens conducted by the Mountbatten Branch of The Royal British Legion. Possibly as many as 600 Nepalese and their British friends joined the celebratory gathering. After the tour of the Museum, the Service at the Chautara and the more leisurely walk through the Gardens, the Day ended with a picnic. The guests enjoyed food provided by the ladies of Eastleigh Gurkha Nepalese Association.



Traditional Nepalese music and dance was rendered by Dhaulagiri Naumati Baza the renowned Nepalese Village

Band; Ms Nita Pun Magar, the famous Nepalese singer and various organisations of dancers. Capt. Bir Bahadur Thapa gave us his very

popular repertoire of songs. Mr. Tanka Sherchan gave his DJ services at a fraction of his usual professional charges and also delighted us when he played Basuri Dhun on his flute.





The program was managed and presented most efficiently by Mr. Yog Kumar Phagami and Mr. Indra Bahadur Purja.
